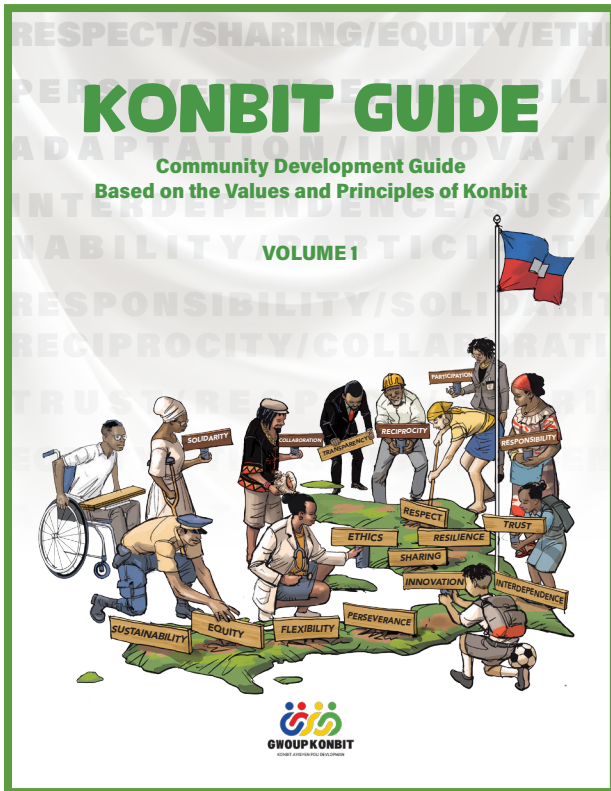




# GID KONBIT

The Konbit Guide is a manual on the history, types, adaptations, and uses of konbit, including an exploration of konbit's five values and twelve principles.



Konbit is a deeply Haitian tradition of mutual aid and solidarity stemming from rural agriculture—but its values and practices are reflected in counterpart terms and concepts around the world. The historic practice of konbit has been revived and embraced by a younger generation, rural and urban alike, as a way to reawaken collective strength across Haiti.

This volume was created through a collective process involving more than 300 people over the course of 55 workshops and five years. It is a living and breathing document intended to inform community-led action in Haiti and inspire other culturally rooted mutual aid movements around the world.

The Konbit Guide is for anyone, in and outside of Haiti, who wants to engage deeply with Haitian history and culture in the theory and practice of community development.

## CHAPTER 1: HISTORY AND EVOLUTION

*Chapter 1 reframes Konbit as more than a rural farming practice; it is a deeply rooted philosophy of solidarity, mutual aid, and collective action that has shaped Haiti's identity. The chapter traces Konbit's evolution across four major historical periods, showing its role in resistance, resilience, and community development.*

Konbit originated from West African communal systems brought by enslaved Africans. These systems emphasized solidarity, shared labor, and mutual support—principles that remained central throughout slavery and beyond.

### 1503–1791: Slavery & Marronage

*Konbit emerged through the creation of Kreyòl and solidarity networks among enslaved Africans. Maroon communities of escaped slaves reflected early Konbit values.*

### 1791–1804: Revolution

*Konbit fueled collective action, unity, and resistance in the Haitian Revolution—from the Bois Caïman ceremony to the Congress of Arcahaie—leading to independence.*

### 1804–1986: Republic & Solidarity

*Post-independence, Haiti extended Konbit's spirit internationally, supporting liberation struggles in Latin America and symbolizing Pan-American solidarity.*

### 1986–Present: Modern Revival

*Konbit resurged through grassroots movements like Konbit Solèy Leve, Kita Nago, and Konbit Bibliyotèk Site Solèy. Practitioners are now called Konbitè and Konbitèz.*

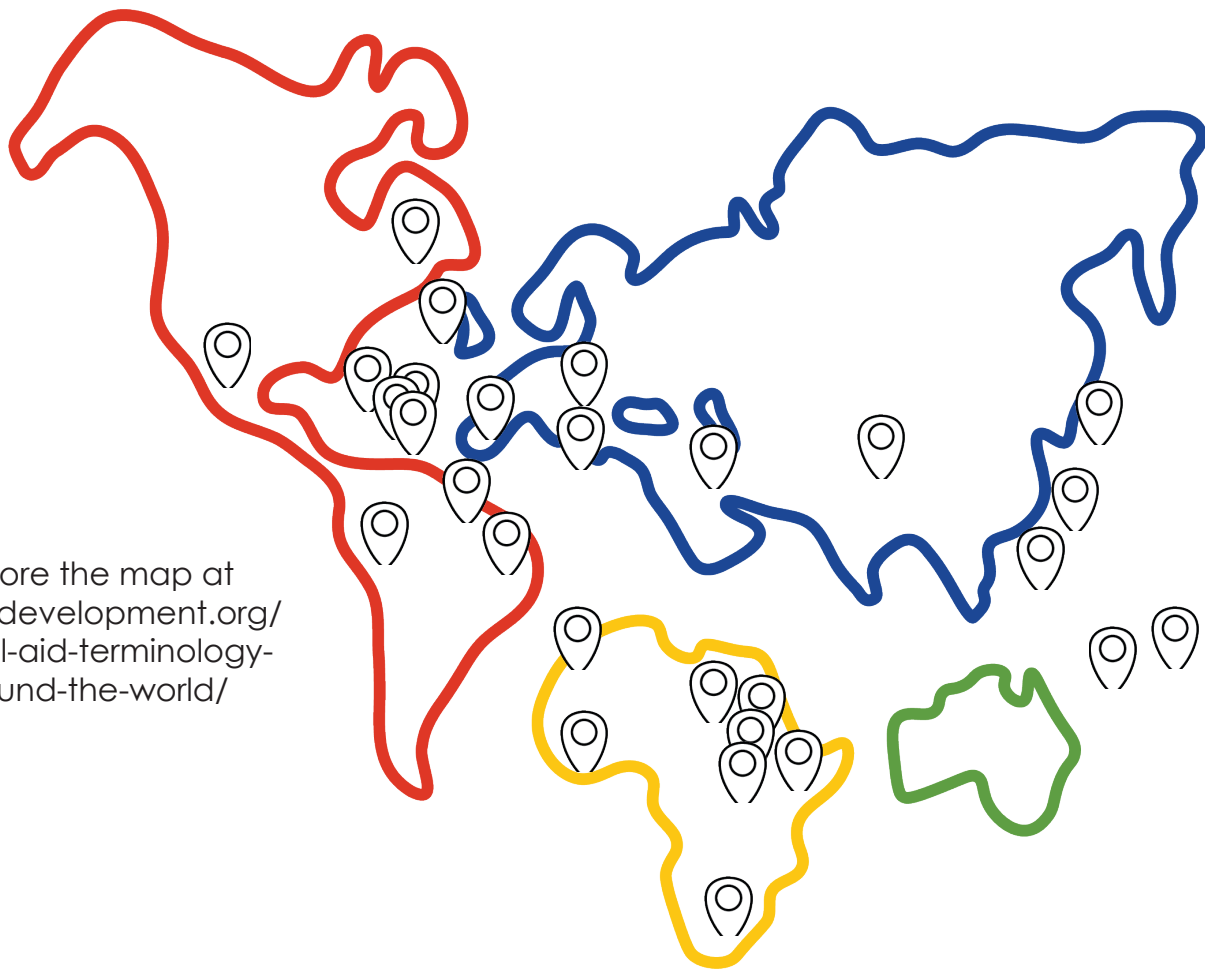

Participation is the lifeblood of Konbit; everyone has a role to play regardless of wealth, age, or status. No one is a spectator.

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### Responsibility

Responsibility ensures that each person is accountable not just to themselves, but to the group's success. It demands showing up, not only physically, but mentally and morally.

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### Solidarity

Solidarity emphasizes collective unity, where the needs of the group outweigh individual interests. It is expressed in moments of both celebration and crisis.

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### Reciprocity

Reciprocity is the social glue, what you give today, you will receive tomorrow. This ongoing cycle of mutual exchange fosters interdependence and emotional investment.

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### Collaboration

Collaboration invites people to work across differences and cultivate shared goals. It transforms diversity into strength, and potential into power.

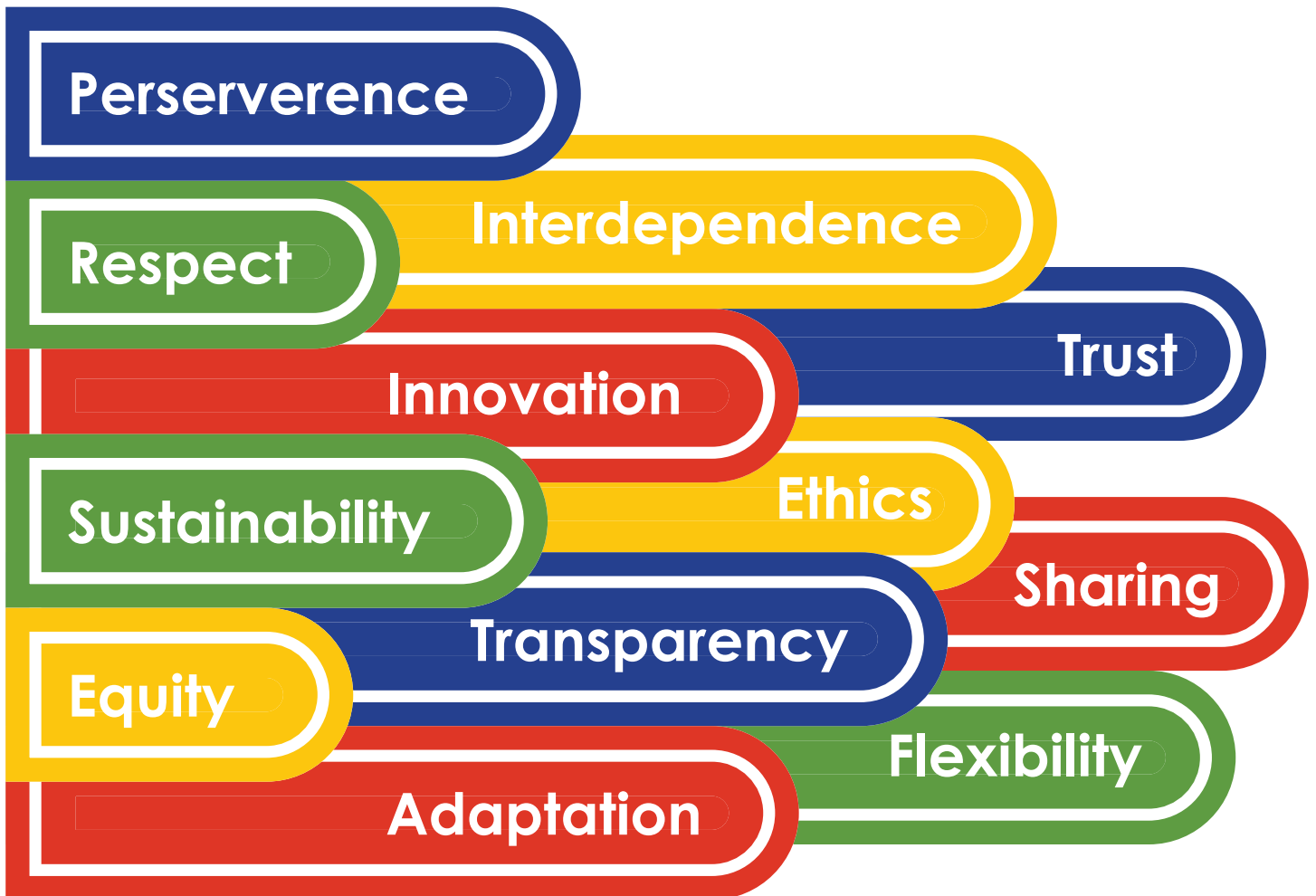

## CHAPTER 9: THREATS TO KONBITISM

Chapter 9 identifies and unpacks the key threats that endanger the survival and sustainability of Konbitism in Haiti. While Konbit remains a culturally rooted practice of solidarity and collective work, it is increasingly challenged by social shifts, economic hardship, and political instability. The chapter focuses on five major forces: migration, modernization, political fragmentation, economic exclusion, and the breakdown of intergenerational knowledge transfer. These pressures not only diminish participation in Konbit, but also undermine the values and structures that allow it to thrive as a grassroots development model.

**Migration, both internal and international, pulls young people and workers away from their communities, reducing the human energy needed to sustain Konbit efforts.**

**Modernization and acculturation lead to the adoption of individualistic lifestyles, foreign development models, and materialist values that displace traditional, community-based systems like Konbit.**

**Political fragmentation and ideological division weaken collective vision and trust, making it harder to unify communities around shared goals and long-term planning.**

**Economic exclusion discourages the participation of the most vulnerable, especially when survival demands override the possibility of volunteering time or labor.**

**Loss of intergenerational knowledge means fewer young people are learning about or valuing Konbit, weakening its cultural transmission.**

These are not just surface-level changes; they challenge the very survival of Konbit. If left unaddressed, they could lead to the slow disappearance of one of Haiti's most important systems of self-reliance and mutual care. Chapter 9 makes it clear that defending Konbit is not about rejecting change, but about adapting with intention. This involves preserving traditional practices, investing in youth leadership, promoting cross-class unity, and ensuring Konbit continues to evolve while staying grounded in Haitian values. Supporting Konbit is supporting a Haiti that leads its own future.
